No letter this week. Just a short postcard. An unusually busy week left no time for several routine chores but I would like to say a word in response to the letter from "A Concerned Young Christian" that appeared in this paper last Sunday. He apparently wants private auricular confession dropped, and if this were to happen, I think it would be a tragedy. Regular private confession continues to be, in my opinion, a keystone of the Catholic's spiritual life. The words of Pope Pius XII, in his encyclical on the Mystical Body, remain as valid today as when they were written in 1947: "To hasten daily progress along the path of virtue, we wish the practice of frequent confession to be earnestly advocated. Not without the inspiration of the Holy Spirit was this practice introduced into the Church. By its genuine self-knowledge is increased, Christian humility grows, bad habits are corrected, spiritual neglect and tepidity are countered, the conscience is purified, the will strengthened, a salutary self-control is attained, and grace is increased in virtue of the sacrament itself."

In the above words, the Pope is speaking of private auricular confession. And it is the experience of every priest confessor that rarely does he have the same opportunity to encourage people to greater love of God and fellowman than he has in the personal, direct meeting in the confessional. I think it would be a great loss to the spiritual life of Catholics if the practice of regular private confession is de-emphasized or weakened. That goes for all Catholics, priests, religious, and laity.

SOME GENERAL PRINCIPLES OF PARTICULAR IMPORTANCE IN INSTRUCTING THE PEOPLE IN THE MYSTERY OF THE EUCHARIST.

24. THE IMPORTANCE OF THE ARRANGEMENT OF CHURCHES FOR WELL-ORDERED CELEBRATIONS

"The house of prayer where the most holy Eucharist is celebrated and preserved should be kept clean and in good order, suitable for prayer and sacred celebrations. It is there too that the faithful gather and find help and comfort in venerating the presence of the Son of God, our Savior, offered for us on the altar of sacrifice."

Pastors must realize then that the way the church is arranged greatly contributes to a worthy celebration and to the active participation of the people.

For this reason the directives and criteria given in the Instruction Inter Oecumenici should be followed regarding: the building of churches and adapting them to the renewed liturgy, the setting up and adorning of altars, the suitable arrangement of the seating for the celebrant and ministers, the correct place from which to give the readings, and the arrangement of the places for the faithful and the choir.

Above all, the main altar should be so placed and constructed that it is always seen to be the sign of Christ Himself, the place at which the saving mysteries are carried out and the center of the assembly, to which the greatest reverence is due.

In adapting churches care will be taken not to destroy treasures of sacred art. If in the interests of liturgical renewal a local Ordinary decides, having obtained the advice of experts and—if needed—the consent of those whom it concerns, to remove some of these works of art from their present position, it should be done with prudence, and in such a way that even in their new surroundings they are well placed.

Pastors will recall that the material and appearance of vestments greatly contributes to the dignity of liturgical celebrations. "They should strive after nobility rather than sumptuous display."

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

WHAT IS THE "TINY TOTS" NURSERY?

Right now it is three large rooms in the church basement sparsely filled with toys and full of plans. The nursery will keep children from one up to four years old occupied productively during the 9:00, 10:00 and 12:00 masses. IT WILL BE FREE OF CHARGE.

WHAT WILL BE IN THE NURSERY?

There will be play pens in which the younger children can rest and play, a play kitchen for "like-mommy" cooking, a model bedroom with dolls, buggies and small furniture, and a "big boy" area with trucks, cars, building blocks, and hobby horses. There will also be books, crayons, puzzles, records, games and other small toys. Your child will be able to play alone or in an organized group.

HOW WILL THE NURSERY OBTAIN SUPPLIES?

TODAY'S BAKE SALE and by donations. We need equipment (new or used) donated, especially dolls, doll buggies, child size furniture, hobby horses, small riding toys, trucks, books, records and area rugs for the cold tile floors. We also need lumber and paint donated or at a good discount price for the building projects.

WHEN WILL THE NURSERY OPEN?

We will open in January after all the building, painting and repairing are completed. There will be an open house the week before.

HOW WILL THE NURSERY BE STAFFED?

The staff will consist of volunteer adults and high school students who are willing to work four Sundays (one hour each) every six months of the year. There will be one nursery helper for each five or six children.

We are a little late with this "thank you". The School Board has asked me to extend their appreciation to you for the fine group of people who came to the first open School Board Meeting. This was very encouraging to them.

This is another S.O.S. for the parents of C.C.D. students. Please be careful when you drive into the school yard at 4:00 o'clock on Monday. Children are dashing here and there and we are afraid someone is going to get hit.

We would like to publicly congratulate the eighth grade on their cooperation and school spirit this year. They have been a tremendous help. Keep up the good work!

In our Archdiocesan School Handbook there are a list of nine regulations regarding absences. We thought they would be a help to you, if we printed them. There are nine, so we will print five this week and four next.

Regulations Regarding Absences:

1. The classroom teacher has the primary responsibility for developing and maintaining a strong motivation for regular attendance on the part of each pupil and for recording and checking accurately pupil attendance.
2. Parents should be instructed to notify the school in advance of a pupil's absence whenever possible and to follow up with a verification of a written excuse when the pupil returns to school. This written explanation should be demanded and kept on file by the teacher for the current year.
3. It is important that all unexplained absences be checked early with the parent. This can be done by means of a telephone call from the school.
4. The parent has the right to keep the child from school for a sufficient reason. The school has the right to judge this reason and to determine whether the absence was necessary or unnecessary.
5. In general, the following reasons are sufficient to classify an absence as necessary and the pupil should be permitted to make up the work missed, including tests:
 - a. sickness
 - b. sickness in the home which makes it necessary for the pupil to remain at home to care for others
 - c. attending the funeral of a member of the immediate family or of a

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

The Marian Medal program emphasizes the spiritual aspect of Girl Scouting.

Workshops will cover such subjects as the Marian Medal Program, Church Investiture, Rededication Ceremonies, the St. Anne Award for Leaders, the Annual Holy Hour, the Senior Spiritual Renewal Program and spiritually oriented program suggestions for the Brownie, Junior, Cadette and Senior levels.

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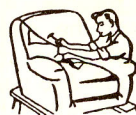
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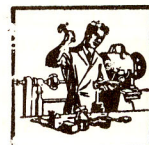
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SURVEY ON SERMONS IS OVER

Thanks a million to all of you, cooperative Parishioners. Thanks especially to Paul Mazade, Jim Opferman, Jim Dei, Bill Egan, Cliff D'Aoust, Harry Tillotson, Ed Dunn, Robert Heintz and Nick Pinto who helped distribute the letters in church. During five consecutive Sundays we polled your opinions and suggestions. It has proved a valuable experience. Reactions from all of you were honest, even though at times we feel you were trying to flatter us a little too much. The survey was conducted on a random sample basis.

Typically a priest received fourteen of the twenty-eight letters distributed, which is 50% sharp: a magnificent response, according to all polling standards.

One out of every three letters were signed. Four out of nine were filled out by men, the rest by women. Three out of four were married, a little less than half were College graduates. The average age of respondents was 41 years. The opinions turned out to be quite independent of age, sex, marital status, education and even of the fact that some letters were signed and some weren't.

As you remember, the envelopes were addressed directly to the priest delivering the sermon. This was done to foster a more sincere response on the part of the parishioners, and to preserve the privacy of the individual priest. No attempt was made to get the average response to all the priests.

From the answers to one priest who volunteered his information, we give the following information:

1. Out of six respondents, four thought the sermons were good, one very good and one mediocre.
2. Four out of five considered the sermons inspiring.
3. Three out of four thought the sermons were just about right in length, and the other thought it was a little bit long; one person thought the sermon was too short.
4. One out of four could not hear very well.

But statistics are not the best fruit of the survey. It is the inspiration received by the individual priest and the desire to do a better job, to improve his enunciation, effectiveness, inspirationability, it is the drive to keep us going and procuring a better spiritual service to the Mystical Body of Christ which is all of you. It is the consciousness

God bless you all. We'll keep trying.

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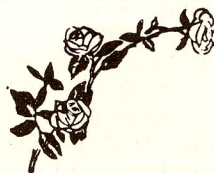

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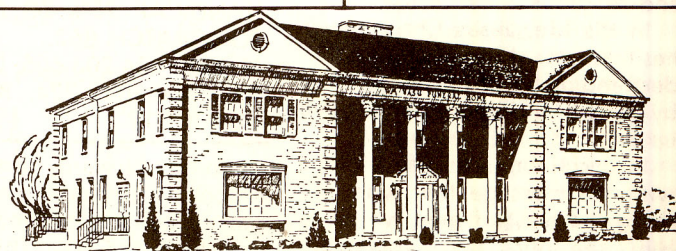
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ALEXANDRINE HOUSE

Alexandrine House—Detroit's stop-over place for some parolees on the way back to our society—is based on the proven principle of self-help with assistance from others. Our motto "A hand-up, not a hand-out" probably expresses it best. AH is the address that serves as a temporary home for men who are seeking to regain their foothold in normal community life. It was established primarily to help those men who would not be paroled because they had no suitable environment to which they could go.

The AH Board of Director's includes Msgr. Clement Kern of Most Holy Trinity Parish, who is also the spiritual director for this non-denominational undertaking.

The realism of the board is coupled with their idealism in hoping that their efforts may help these men to reconstruct their lives.

As you and I stumble through life, picking ourselves up (which very often necessitates help from others), these men also, having paid their debt, are looking forward to their personal re-establishment.

Paying a nominal per diem rate to AH, these men on their initiative and with help seek out jobs and visit with their families in a relaxed state of mind. As you realize, this accomplished self-sufficiency is a most necessary and satisfying need for personal dignity.

Incorporated in the function of AH is Christ's message for personal involvement. This primarily consists of the Sunday dinner being brought in and shared by families like yours and ours. Screaming, laughing, crying, fighting children of all ages and bottle-fed babies included.

In addition to a home-cooked meal, the family or families present showing love and friendship in a relaxed atmosphere give the men some ray of hope that they are wanted, needed, accepted, and loved. This setting is many times brightened by clergy and religious.

In His life, Jesus Christ never hesitated to show love and understanding to the souls rejected by others and those who gave up hope.

In correlating His life of love with the message that what we do to the least of men we do to Him, the personal involvement function of the AH operation is a welcoming way to provide families an opportunity to encounter Christ.

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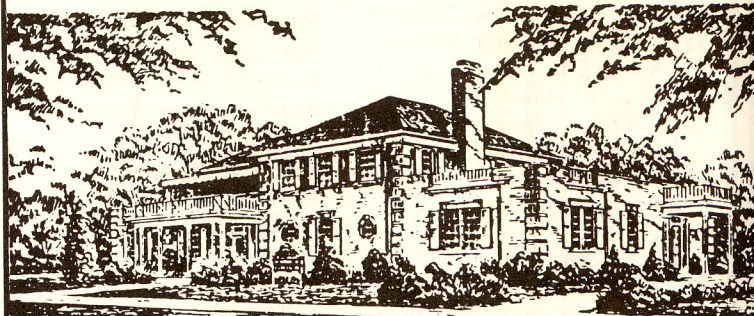
