TO CATHOLICS FOR PUBLIC EDUCATION:

After reading your statement and you being a sub-committee of STOPS that opposes state aid to parents of non-public school students, I became aware that your organization was hastily formed not to support public education but to oppose non-public education.

You state "that there are great and pressing needs facing many of our communities that require our resources". We agree. One of the pressing needs is the education of all children, including the deprived children in our inter cities. The "Childrens' Education Act" can attack this problem. And this you oppose.

Secondly, your statement points out, "to fund parochial schools at state expense can only lead to a weakening of the spirit of unity and ecumenism". You have failed to realize that the members of CEF are Lutherans, Christian Reforms, Jews, as well as Catholic Parents and others who have been working together in a most ecumenical manner for Christian justice for the last seven years in Michigan and the nation. Unity and ecumenism without justice is impossible.

From my own personal experience, I believe CEF has brought me in closer contact with non-Catholics than all my other activities. I have worked many years with people of all faiths in CEF. I have learned to respect and understand their beliefs and they mine. I recall Dr. John Vanderburg, Dean of Calvin Christian College, saying "When I first met with this group (CEF) I was suspicious of your motives. It has taken me the better part of a year to understand my Catholic brethren. Today I believe I do, and for this I thank you". And this you oppose.

CEF is a positive organization. It has supported public education and public school millage votes. It has fought for the civil rights of all parents in the passage of the Fair Bus Law, the College Scholarship Law, the College Tuition Grant Law and the Auxiliary Services Law and the proposed Childrens' Education Bill. CEF has fought for equal rights of all children, public and non-public, in the true Christian American tradition. And this too you oppose.

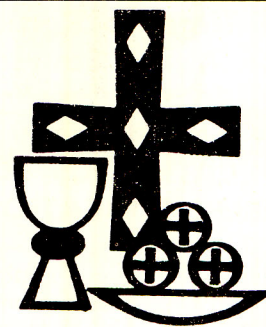

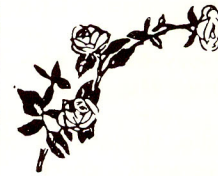

**Rosary Crusade
Twenty-Five

Father Patrick Peyton, famous for his work in promoting the Family Rosary Crusade, recently marked the twenty-fifth anniversary of his now famous apostolate.

Each week approximately 160 radio stations of the Mutual Network carry "Family Theatre," which is a half hour show, non-sectarian in content, concluding with a one minute commentary on the value of prayer.

Radio specials that have been produced by Father Peyton, who is now in Vietnam — include the "Thanksgiving Hour," the "Joyful Hour," and the "Triumphant Hour," aired at Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter over the Mutual Network as well as the Armed Forces Network and independent stations.

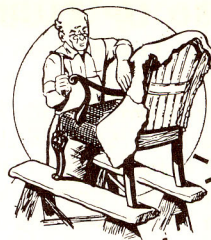

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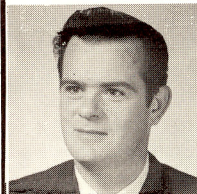

Jesus wanted his basket of food. "What would you do? Would you give it to Him? Even if you were very hungry? Would you love Him enough for that?" All the children agreed that they would do exactly as that young boy had done. To demonstrate, I had made some small rolls to represent the barley loaves and Raymond Bizon had cut some small fish and the figure of a young boy out of wood. We started with just five loaves and two fishes. The children took turns sharing and passing but there wasn't enough to go around even our small class. I then showed how Jesus took this small amount of food, thanked His Heavenly Father for it and gave it to His friends to pass among the thousands of hungry people gathered there. This time, when I gave the basket of food to the little "apostles", there was plenty of food for everyone. What a wonderful thing Jesus had done! The children were delighted. I asked them to decide right then what they will do the next time they have candy or cookies. Sharing treats is a little harder than sharing wooden fish and hard rolls, but they were all sure that they would remember this story and show their love for others by sharing with them their love, time, toys and food. I then told the children how, after everyone had eaten, the crumbs were gathered up so that nothing would be wasted. Making some crumbs to be gathered sounded like great fun to all of them, but as one boy put it, "You can't even make any good crumbs with these hard old things." I'm afraid he was talking about my rolls; not the wooden fish.

I asked the children, then, if they would share their time and love by working together on a big mural for me. They each worked very hard on their part and signed their names to it so that I would have something special to remember them by. To thank them for their gift and show my love for each one of them, I shared some treats I had brought from home. Two little boys giggled and confessed, "We saw these on your desk and we just KNEW you'd give us one." Such faith these precious young ones have in us!

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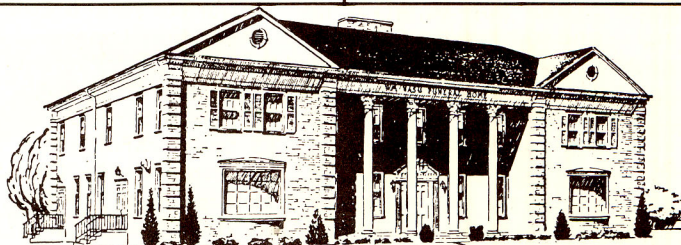
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A LETTER FROM FR. FLORENCE

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My dear friends:

It is now two and a half years since I left the Shrine of the Little Flower. Fourteen years were spent there and I treasure many happy memories of the Shrine, its wonderful priests, Sisters, teachers and people. I keep all of them in a special place in my daily Mass and prayers.

Down here at Mishawaka I am leading a quiet life. I am the assistant chaplain at a Franciscan motherhouse, where I take care of the Infirmary for the old Sisters and teach religion in the school for Aspirants (they are high school girls thinking about becoming Sisters).

For the last year and a half I have been having a little trouble with my health. Fr. Coughlin used to call me 'the atomic priest.' I hope and pray that the Lord will give me a new supply of atomic energy. In these exciting days in the Church I want to carry on for many more years in the priesthood.

I haven't been back to the Shrine since June of 1966. But I do hope to be able to get away one of these days to make a visit there.

I am writing to you now with a specific purpose and would like to have your cooperation. In 1957 I launched a movement in the Shrine Grade School to teach mental prayer to grade school students. It began with a holy 'hunch' after reading Abbot Boylan's book THIS TREMENDOUS LOVER. He recommended that we try to get all of our Catholic people to make at least fifteen minutes of mental prayer a day. I had attempted to teach mental prayer to high school and college students, but the results had not been very great. Would it work in grade school? I found that the boys and girls, even in the low grades, were ready to learn mental prayer and could do it quite well. So I felt that the mental prayer movement, carried on from 1957 to 1965, was quite successful.

For some time I have had in mind to write a booklet on mental prayer for the guidance of grade school religion teachers and pupils. It will be easy to write. I hope to be able to find a publisher.

The Second Vatican Council has issued a call to the laity to take a more active part in the liturgy, to greater holiness of life and to be apostles in the world.

Writers on spirituality for the laity emphasize that mental prayer is an important thing to realize those objectives. If mental prayer is to be taught to our people, I think that the ideal place to start is in the grade school. I feel that I have an obligation to publicize what was accomplished at the Shrine so that others may realize that mental prayer can be taught to children and will know how to do it.

So I appeal to all of my old pupils of mental prayer, whether they be in high school, college or working out in the world, to send me their comments. Have you continued the practice of mental prayer? How has it helped you? About how long do you do it each day? What books or booklets on mental prayer have you found helpful? What difficulties do you sometimes experience in trying to practice mental prayer? Your comments will be a great help in writing that book.

Please write to me at the above address. I cannot promise a personal reply to all of your letters. But I shall appreciate all of them and give you an acknowledgement in THE SHRINE HERALD.

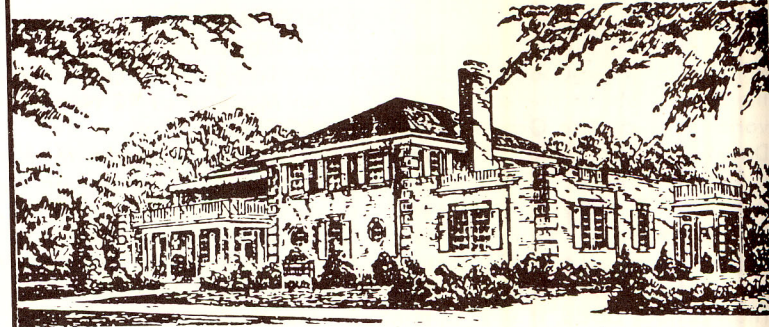
