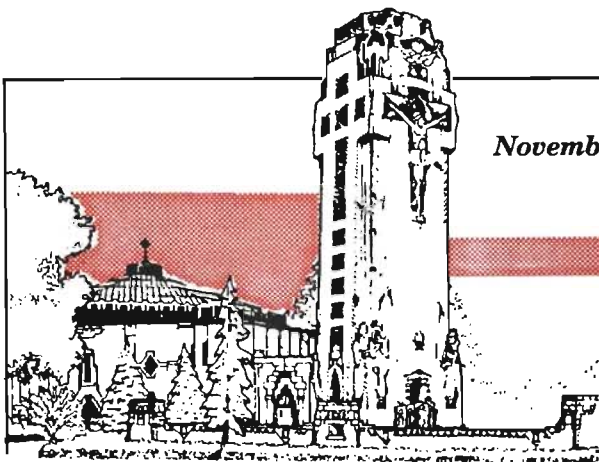

Dear Friends in Christ:

On this Campaign for Human Development Appeal Weekend, it seems fitting to reflect on the words of Pope John Paul II as he spoke to the people of Mexico earlier this year:

"I invite all Christians and all persons of goodwill to awaken the social conscience of solidarity: we cannot live or sleep in peace while thousands of our sisters and brothers, very near us, lack the very essentials for leading a dignified human existence."

Twenty years ago, the bishops launched the Campaign. During these past two decades, CHD has worked to increase the awareness and understanding of all our Church's rich social teaching. Through the efforts of the Campaign, we are able to support organized groups of low-income people working to change the face of their neighborhoods and communities. These two efforts have produced a new sense of solidarity in our land, a solidarity that expresses itself in many collaborative efforts.

Last year alone in our own Archdiocese, CHD funds supported eight self-help groups involved in varied projects. Some of you are aware of, or are participants in, some of these groups. The grant recipients in our area are primarily involved in salvaging housing and making it available to low income families; tutoring children

My decision is made in the midst of feeling rather successful, competent, and happy in what I have been doing. It does not come from a negative stance, but from a positive one.

Thank you for all your prayers, support, and encouragement during the past three years. As I said last weekend, Shrine has a remarkable energy and is the most overtly prayerful parish I have served. May you continue to PROCLAIM JESUS AS LORD AND YOURSELVES AS SERVANTS OF ONE ANOTHER FOR HIS SAKE.

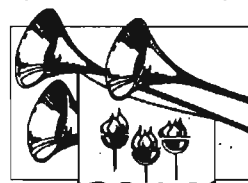

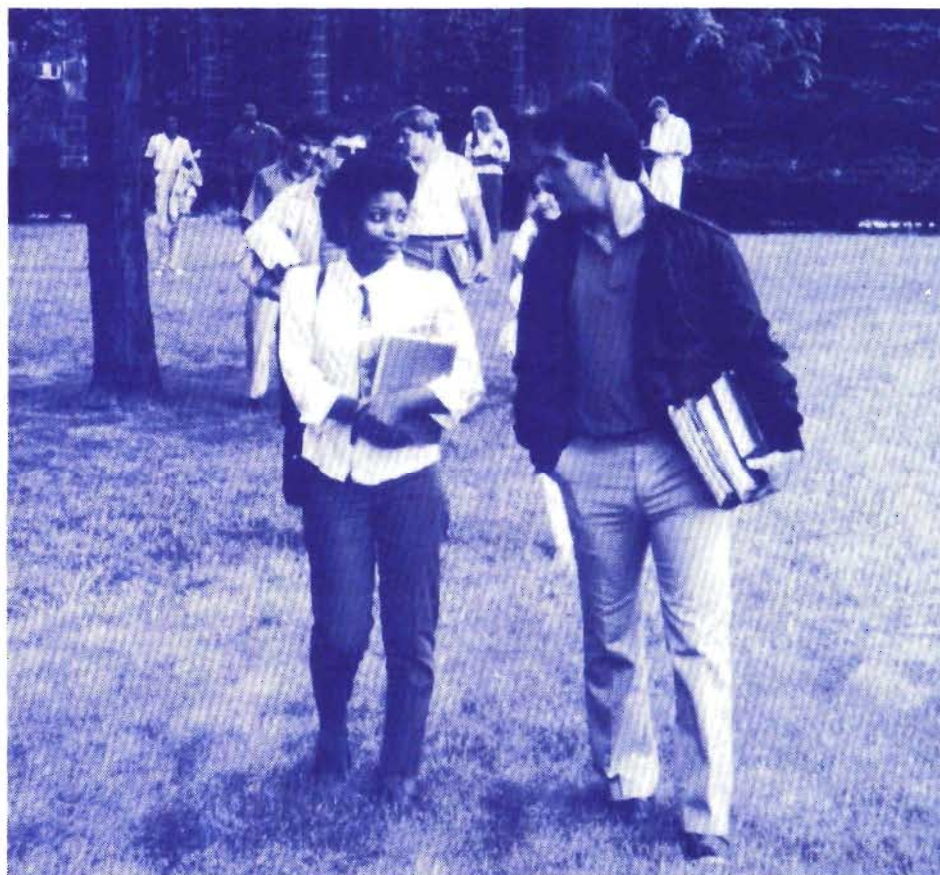

A Pilgrimage to Eastern Europe

Part II

We left Prague and arrived in Berlin by evening. We passed through "Checkpoint Charlie" as easily as crossing the Michigan-Ohio border. (Reunification will have been a week later.) It was amazing to think that just over a year ago someone would have been shot trying to climb the wall! After spending an hour and half trying to find a place to stay we went to Poland and spent the night in a border town called Szczecin.

The next morning we went northeast from Szczecin to Gdansk on the Baltic Sea. This is the city where the first shots of WWII were fired and where the free trade union Solidarity was born after the strikes in 1980. The old town of Gdansk is quite beautiful with Gothic, Renaissance and Mannerist architecture. We even saw a Russian ship at the docks.

The Solidarity office was across the street from the Archives so we decided to go over and see if we could visit Lech Walesa who is running for president of Poland. After some persuasion Walesa came out and said hello to us. We wished him well in the elections and he wished us well also.

We left Gdansk for the castle Malbork. This castle was one of the most powerful strongholds in medieval Europe. From the years 1308 to 1457, it was the residence of the Grand Masters of Teutonic Order.

We arrived in Warsaw on Friday night and spent the following day touring the city. Warsaw was almost completely destroyed by WWII; however, the restoration of "old town" was done according to 19th century pictures of the city. One of our visits was to the grave of Fr. Jerszy Popieluszko, the pro-Solidarity priest who was killed in 1984. He is buried in the parish yard; the monument for the grave is a large marble cross connected to a rosary built with huge stones. I thought about him as a good example for other priests as a courageous leader. There is a picture of the Pope kissing the cross in 1987.

On Saturday night we went to a restaurant that featured folk dancers. On Sunday morning we went to the university parish for Mass. The participation was very good.

On Sunday afternoon we had lunch at the Mother House of the sisters who live and work at the Casa Santa Maria. The house is located about halfway between Warsaw and Czestochowa.

We arrived at the Pauline Monastery of Czestochowa (founded in 1382) in time for dinner with the monks. Afterwards we were given a tour of the place. We were even invited to sign a special guest book in the 18th century library! The next morning, October 1st, we celebrated Mass in front of the painting of Our Lady of Czestochowa. Legend attributes the painting to St. Luke but scholars think that it was done in the 9th century. The shrine has been part of Polish nationalism ever since prayers to her halted the Swedish invasion in the year 1655.

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Hunger and the Gulf Crisis

The new report on world hunger, *Hunger 1990*, published by the Bread for the World Institute on Hunger and Development, highlights the roles militarization and the worldwide \$1 trillion (1,000,000,000,000 or one million times a million) military spending budget play in hunger.

Bread for the World believes that recent events in the Mideast confirm rather than contradict the need for new approaches to common security as defined in their *Harvest of Peace Resolution*. The militarization of the Mideast has heightened tensions and laid the groundwork for the current conflict. The United States, the Soviet Union and European nations have provided tens of billions of dollars in arms to Mideast nations during the 1980s. By arming the "enemies of one's enemies," the world is now seeing the fruits in increased militarization in an already volatile region.

The *Harvest of Peace Resolution* calls for reduced arms sales and military aid and enhanced use of regional and international negotiations to encourage peaceful settlement of conflicts. But the winds of war are blowing all around us. Even without fighting it is costing us \$46 Million per day to deploy & maintain our troops in Saudi Arabia! An Angle on Abortion

In the October 27th issue of *America*, the Jesuit weekly, Mary E. & Leon J. Podles presented an article, "The Feminine and Universal Salvation". The entire article was on the hope or possibility that all will be saved. Part of the article, a reflection on Mary, the Virgin-Mother, as the natural symbol of this hope, included a reflection on abortion.

Mary's motherhood, already a natural symbol of the hope of universal salvation, is ratified and taken up as a new symbol. Both in the East and the West, she bears the titles that speak of the Christians' hope in her: Refuge of sinners, Mother of God - Quick to hear, Mother of God - Searcher of the Lost, Mother of God - Soothe my Sorrows, Mother of God - Sweet Kissing, Mother of God - Joy of All That Sorrow. In one of the oldest prayers to her, we read "*Sub tuum praesidium confugimus, Sancta Dei Genetrix*" ("We fly to your protection, Holy Mother of God").

This is why abortion has a special horror for Catholics. It is hated not simply as the killing of a child, but as an attack on the natural symbol of the unity of the race that gives us any hope we have of security in this life and in the life to come. In the old creation, which will persist to the end of the world, Man and Woman, Adam and Eve, husband and wife are the core of society, and their relationship is the key to the salvation or destruction of us all. Yet even that relationship already exists for the sake of children and the society they imply. In the new creation, which is already present among us, the New Man and the New Woman are Son and Mother, Christ and Mary. The focus shifts from the relationship of husband and wife to mother and child. From their cooperation the fruitfulness of the new creation springs forth. Abortion, therefore, is a symbolic striking at the very hope for salvation, an attempt to deny the bond of the unity of mother and child that provides our hope.

Seven years ago, I was in a little Piper Cub flying across Ohio from a meeting, when we hit a vicious hailstorm. The wings started to flap, the plane started to buckle, we dropped in air pockets, and we started to spin around. I became absolutely convinced that I would be dead in five minutes. When I turned to the Lord he gave me a deep sense of peace. I had never felt so utterly and completely secure in my whole life. I tasted his glory, majesty and beauty so profoundly that I became indifferent to whether or not the plane crashed. The pilot did put the plane into a nose dive, caught a current of air at the bottom of the storm, and landed.

The experience that the Lord gave me of himself for a moment in that airplane ... He is the Lord and that's all that counts.

World Famous Ten Essentials

For those who love the wilderness and seek to enjoy it by strapping on a backpack and hiking a trail, the task of deciding what to take along is limited by the amount that one can carry, 40 - 60 pound loads seem to be the maximum. Backpackers spend small fortunes shaving ounces from tents and sleeping bags. Freeze dried food, while costing quite a bit of money, is chosen over other foods, such as cans, because of the weight. However, every backpacker knows that there are ten essentials that can never be left out for their survival, in the event of the unexpected, their life may depend on them. They include: a compass, a whistle, dry matches, fire starter, extra clothes, extra food, a knife, rain gear, some first aid patches, and a needle. Others also add a repair kit for their pack, sun screen or bug repellent. These are essential because the hikers life may depend on them.

In the Gospel today, we hear of wise and foolish virgins. The wise had extra fuel for their torches, the foolish took only what they expected to need. The problem was that the groom was late, unexpectedly.

Life is full of the unexpected. They may include illness, death, crises at work or play, lost jobs and so on. Like the hiker in the wilderness we, too, need ten essentials if we are to survive. Everyone would have them within easy grasp and know how to use them. They include: a bible, a rosary, a friend, a confessor, a Mass schedule, a quiet place, a relationship with Jesus, a love of the Eucharist, a time for prayer, and a heart in tune with the Lord. Our survival may depend on them.
