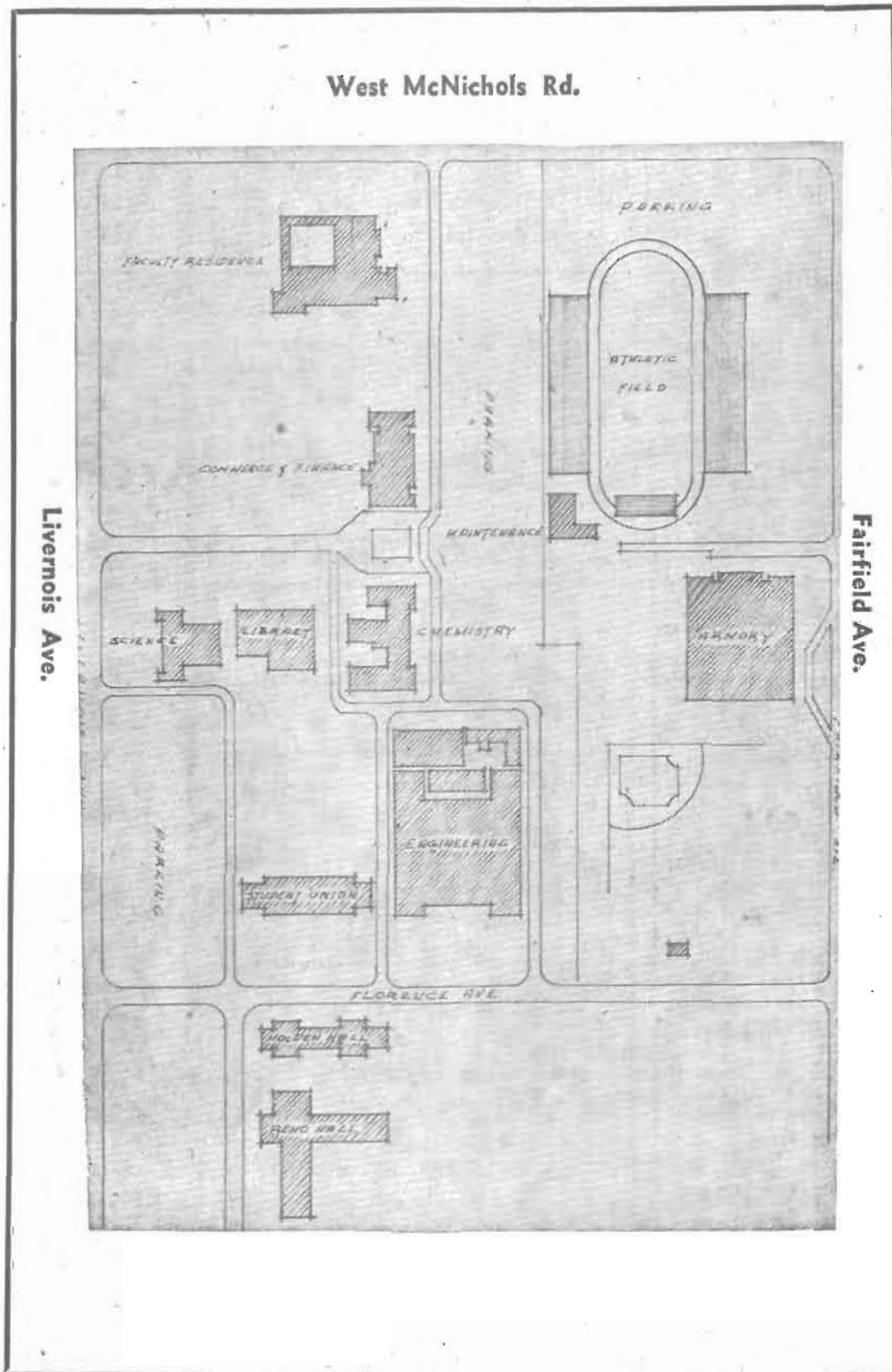

Since that time various departments were added—the College of Engineer-ing before the close of the same year; the School of Law the fol-lowing year, 1912. The Evening Col-lege of Commerce and Finance was begun in 1916; the Day College of Commerce and Finance was opened in 1922.

University of Detroit History. — The University of Detroit began its edu-cational work in 1877 and was in-corporated April 27, 1881, according to the laws of the State of Mich-igan under the title of "Detroit College," with power to grant such literary honors and confer such de-grees as are usually conferred by similar colleges and institutions of learning in the United States.

A re-organization was effected in Graduate degrees were conferred for the first time in 1885, but the fuller organization of graduate studies was not effected until 1927, when a Graduate Division was established. In 1950 this became the Graduate School. The School of Dentistry was established in 1932.

The evening classes in Arts and Sciences and in Engineering were inaugurated in 1938, and the Mc-Nichols Road Evening Division was formally organized as a separate unit of the University in 1945. De-partments of education, journalism, social science, foreign trade, etc., were added at various periods. In January, 1945, an affiliation was effected with the Detroit Institute of Musical Art.

SPRING CARNIVAL—Offices: Basement, Publication Bldg., ext. 267. Annual student fund raising festival for Student Activities Building. Includes two-day carnival midway in State Fair coliseum, with dance in adjoining agricultural building. An intercollegiate Plover Derby is held on the State Fair Racetrack with a card of eight races the second afternoon of the carnival. The midway generally includes from 35 to 50 attractions, ferris wheel, food service, wheel of chance booths, sideshows with all-boy chorus line (All of our prettiest women are men!) and musical entertainment.

Almost all student and faculty organizations participate in various phases of the Carnival activities. 1956 Carnival, May 4-6. Carnival committee names an "American of the Year" who receives a special scroll during ceremonies at the Carnival. The Rev. James Keller was so named in 1953, and Arthur Godfrey in 1952. In 1951 Ed Sullivan served as Master of the Revels for a variety program, and Ted Lewis was the King's Jester. Others on the program included Byron Nelson, the Four Dukes and U. of D. talent. In 1953 WJR broadcast a special program from the Carnival covering the Fr. Keller award. Bing Crosby, Loretta Young and Bob Hope joined the program from Hollywood. Since the first Carnival in 1949 students have raised more than \$170,000 for the Student Activities Building Fund. In addition, as a result of his visit to the 1952 Carnival, Arthur Godfrey returned the following year with his entire show to stage a benefit performance which added \$16,300 to the fund. HOMECOMING—Annual weekend of activity for alumni, students and faculty under the supervision of the Student Council committee. Events include parade of student organization—constructed floats (in 1955 about 30 of them), U. of D. Band, Army and Air Force ROTC drill teams, and the queen-elect and her court. The queen and court are elected by students (from candidates backed by campus organizations) after a week of colorful campaigning. Parade generally starts at Outer Drive and Livernois, moves south on Livernois to McNichols, and thence to the parking lot in front of the stadium for cheers, speeches, singing and the lighting of the bonfire, which traditionally gathered the previous year by the freshmen, and sometimes occasionally burned in advanced by the sophomores. Judges select the top three floats, the name of the organization sponsoring the number one float is engraved on a special trophy. The Bonfire Bounce dance follows in the Memorial Building. Prior to the football game the following day the alumni hold a reception, generally at the Latin Quarter, and for the two hours before game time. The queen is crowned during halftime ceremonies and floats paraded. The evening of a day-time game, or the next evening after a night game the Homecoming Dance is held, usually in the Memorial Bldg.
